

AP Art History 2022/2023 Summer Assignment

Welcome to AP Art History!

This course seeks to understand and analyze the history of the world through 250 works of art and architecture. Each work is unique and tells its own story about the people, places, and events that were going on at that specific moment in history. Although we do cover many different areas, civilizations, religions, and people groups, we do not cover them all. We also do not have the opportunity to discuss some major artists, works of art, or styles of art and architecture, that have made an impact on the world of art and subsequently on art history.

This year's summer assignment is going to be the same as last years. Normally, I would send you to the Princeton University Art Museum to experience art in person and to see many of the different styles and works of art that we would examine throughout the year (including an Aztec Sacrificial Stone...). Since, as of writing this on June 11th, 2022, the Princeton University Art Museum is under construction and remodeling until the end of the 2023 calendar year at the earliest. So, I am choosing to continue a summer assignment that you can complete at home and on your own time. We will still do the Princeton University Art Museum scavenger hunt at the end of the 2022/2023 school year!

We will start the year by examining a movement of art that is somewhat misunderstood and, if you are an artist who takes part in this movement, possibly even exploited and/or considered a criminal. **This year's summer assignment will focus on introducing yourself to AP Art History through street art.** Although commonly referred to as "graffiti", street art is so much more than just poorly planned names signed on train cars or haphazard murals quickly put up on public walls. Street art can take many forms (graffiti, mosaics, murals, yarn bombing, and much more!) and it often, if planned well enough and has a purpose, can actually improve local communities in multiple ways.

1. [Is graffiti Art? Or vandalism? - TED ED](#)

- This brief and animated history of street art asks a very important question about street art: Is it worth millions of dollars or is it a crime?

- As mentioned above, street art and murals have an extensive and vivid history all around the world. Yet, it took us until 2010 to really begin to understand the value that murals have on the community, the health and wellness of that said community, and on the economy.

- This TED talk, given by JR (who was mentioned in Mary McCarthy's TED talk) explains how he uses street art for good. His works are moving and he highlights the plight of many different people around the world. From the tough suburbs of Paris to the favelas of Brazil, streets of India, and beyond, JR uses art to raise awareness. Be sure to turn on Closed Captioning if you have a difficult time understanding his accent.
