Dear Montgomery Township School District Community,

With spring in full swing and the school year quickly ending, it's the perfect time to give some wonderful updates on what's happening in the district! It is hard to believe that the first day of school was almost eight months ago. A lot of exciting events and activities have been taking place across our district since my last newsletter in December, and I wanted to highlight some of them.

As part of our overall strategic planning goals and initiatives, each school held a Principal's Roundtable event in January, while I held a Superintendent's Roundtable in February. We wanted the roundtables to be an opportunity to share information about various district initiatives and procedures, and simply come together as a community.

For OHES, the focus of the discussion was student decision-making and responsibility and how the Cub Core Values relate to these important skills. The VES administrative team provided an overview of the school's core value system, Blazer's Beliefs, and how it empowers students to make good choices and follow the code of conduct. The LMS presentation centered on the discipline model at the school and how it connects to student growth and empowerment. UMS administrators spoke about their code of conduct and why being a trauma-informed restorative school has helped their students. At MHS, the discussion revolved around how academic stress and anxiety impact our students and how incorporating regulation skills into daily life can help protect their mental health. Finally, I held a meet-and-greet with our district's safety and security personnel and provided insight on some of the systems, programs, and procedures that we use to keep our students and staff safe.

Orchard Hill

❖ The 100th Day of School was a milestone for our OHES Cubs. Over the first 100 days, they have worked hard to build their literacy and mathematics skills while also learning how to be responsible and respectful citizens in their school community. The 100th Day was celebrated with various activities and events centered on the number 100. Students participated in counting activities such as counting 100 items and practicing skip counting



by tens. In many classrooms, students worked on special projects, such as creating a 100 things display, drawing pictures that represent 100, or writing about what they would do if they had 100 dollars.





- OHES students gave tribute to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. with a Week of Service. During the week of January 20-24, Orchard Hill students learned about his commitment to helping others and participated in activities to support serving their communities. Our Cubs filled 16 boxes and over 30 shopping bags with donations for the Montgomery Food Bank at Princeton Elks. Students took part in the Color A Smile initiative, a nonprofit that distributes cheerful drawings to senior citizens, troops overseas, and anyone in need of a smile! The organization mails thousands of drawings each month. Finally, to end the week and build an inclusive and welcoming school community, students participated in Mix It Up Day by engaging in buddy activities with another class.
- Our Cubs have also been enjoying our STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) Lab. STEM education sparks curiosity by encouraging students to ask questions and explore new ideas. It encourages them to think critically and analyze the world in a scientific way. Whether it's conducting experiments, building prototypes, or working with new technologies, students learn how to approach challenges systematically and solve problems. STEM activities involve teamwork, where students work together to brainstorm, experiment, and solve problems. Collaborative work in STEM helps students develop communication skills, learn to work with others toward a common goal, and embrace diverse perspectives.



❖ All of our OHES students are learning how to write letters, words, sentences, and stories. Throughout the winter, our students attended assemblies with speakers who shared tips and tricks about the writing process and their love of storytelling. One of our speakers shared the inspiration for his stories and even taught the students how to draw. Another speaker shared her tips for writing interesting and engaging stories and encouraged our young writers to keep idea boxes.

Village

Village School families and friends enjoyed fine entertainment at the Montgomery Performing Arts Center in celebration of Music in Our Schools Month. The fourth-grade bands and the fourth-grade Orchestra performed an impressive repertoire of pieces. Our young musicians have demonstrated incredible growth as individuals and as important members of large ensembles since they started their instrumental music studies in September. VES lays the foundation for the phenomenal music program that we hope students continue to participate in as they progress through the district. 

Nine earned a first, second, or third-place finish. Of those nine, four also received an Honor Roll Certificate, which means they scored in the top five percent nationally!



On Friday, February 28th, and Saturday, March 1st, UMS Performing Arts proudly presented High School Musical Jr. The incredibly dedicated team of directors worked together with over 75 skilled and devoted students to bring you this exciting production.
